

BCC Enters the Home Stretch

As we near the completion of construction on our new building at 6090 Pico, there is an amazing amount of activity at our new building. The noise, dust, and commotion are most impressive. Every day a new component of the building is being installed. Concurrently, Building Committee members, volunteers, staff and clergy are making decisions and getting things done. Special thanks must go to our extraordinary Executive Director, Felicia Park-Rogers, who somehow manages to ensure our

systems from our sanctuary so our services and programs can be accessed anywhere in the world with an Internet connection. We have wired for a projector and installed a screen adjacent to the ark that allows us to display images and text during services. The classrooms have video monitors for instructional purposes and display of proceedings in the sanctuary.

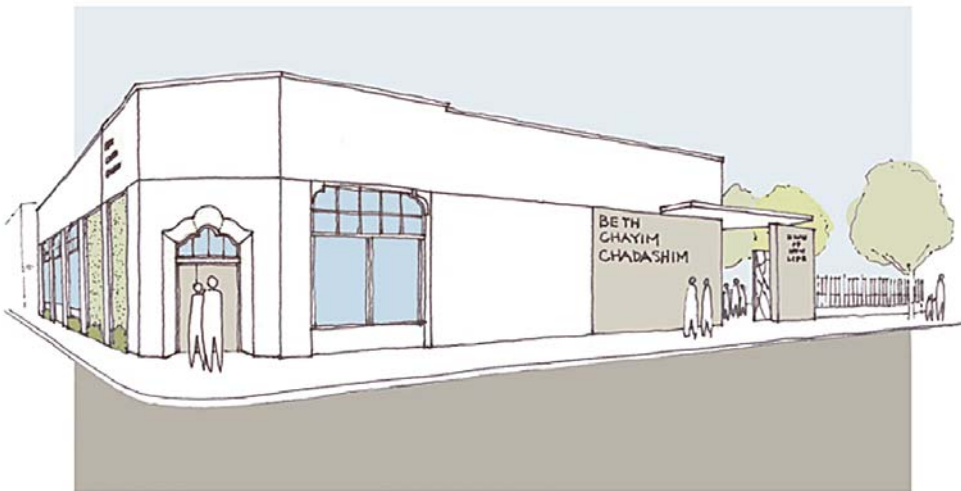
Special thanks must also go to Jerry Hanson and Davi Cheng who are working on building the leaded glass doors for our new ark. These are designed to complement our relocated stained glass windows. The steel framing for the relocated stained glass is being installed between the sanctuary and the lobby. This defines the shapes of those rooms. The stained glass will be backlit by daylight from the lobby and at night by spotlights. It will be very beautiful.

Jerry and Davi are also building a new ner tamid (eternal light) that will hang inside our ark. In keeping with our environmentally sustainable focus and thanks to a generous donation from William Korthof, our ner tamid is solar powered with battery backup. Look for its solar panel on the wall adjacent to the south entry. William also

donated the roof mounted photovoltaic panels that will generate a large proportion of our electricity and return any excess capacity to the utility grid.

The restrooms are now complete. Each is accented with brightly colored ceramic tile walls. In keeping with our LEED certification we have low water consumption fixtures, a waterless urinal, and tankless water heater. All restrooms are

disabled accessible and have proper baby changing tables.

The parking lot has been graded and the stairs, ramps and planters adjacent to the new entry are being installed. We have selected low water consumption trees to shade the south wall of the building. The existing steel security louvers currently on the front of the building are being repurposed to become enclosure screens for the new trash area and electric transformer at the rear parking lot.

We have made trips to Ikea to purchase bookshelves and cabinetry.

We are researching and ordering new seating. The commercial kitchen equipment is being ordered. The Story Lines copper strips for the ark wall are being completed and made ready for installation. Telephones, computers and re-used office furniture are being researched and selected. Final operational details are being worked out. It is both exhausting and exhilarating.

Please watch for email updates for volunteer opportunities as we approach our move in date and our April 10 dedication.

Story Lines Enhance our New Home

In a series of workshops in January and February, BCC members participated in a unique project to beautify and give special meaning to the sanctuary in our new home. On the wall surrounding our new ark, stretching from floor to ceiling, will be a series of copper strips on which BCC members have written pieces of their personal stories. At least half of our congregation has participated and we have more than 150 strips so far! The consensus is that the workshops, ably led by Kadin Henningsen, Leslie Tuchman, Renee Lamkay, Bonnie Kaplan, and Sylvia Sukop have been a moving experience that has

brought people closer together. Our new sanctuary will indeed be blessed. We have also been receiving text from some members who live far away or have been unable to attend a workshop.

Space will be reserved for additional strips which current and future members may wish to add, and there will be an interactive website where the text on the strips can be viewed and, if members so choose, the complete stories from which the text is taken may be read as well.

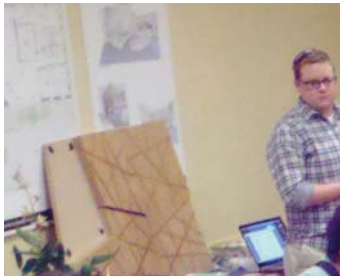

Rodney Dangerfield used to quip: "When I was a kid my parents moved a lot, but I always found them."

BCC's new home is a mere two blocks from our current home, so

I don't think many of us will get lost on our way there, but I know some of us are worried we'll be lost when we get there. Although our phone numbers, website, and Facebook page will remain the same, and our street address will barely change – add a tail to the middle zero and voila! 6000 becomes 6090 — in some ways our new home and our old will be worlds apart.

Are we ready for it or will we be lost in our new space? When most people move out of a home they've lived in for 33 years, they're downsizing – kids grown and gone, maybe a spouse gone too, or just time to reduce the number of stairs to climb or the costs of maintenance. But on the eve of BCC's 40th anniversary (2012), after 33 years in one home, we're upsizing – yikes!

Many years ago my brother brought home a brand new car unannounced. He thought his three-year daughter would be so excited; instead she climbed screaming into the backseat and nearly kicked a hole in the back of the front seat. "I HATE this car," she yelled, without even looking at it. "I want our old car back." That event happened almost as many years ago as BCC moved into 6000 W. Pico, yet I still think about it whenever I see or experience dramatic change in what's familiar, beloved, comfortable. I remember that little kid screaming – and I remember too that by the next day she loved the new car and couldn't wait to show it to her friends.

Our move is exciting to be sure, yet I'm well aware that even a carefully planned, years in the making, group effort like ours will cause more than a little emotional distress and physical stress (it has already). Newness, change, difference inevitably bring with them some uncertainty and anxiety. Most of the faces at 6090 will be familiar, but even as we hope the

familiar faces will bring some new friends with them, to share the space and the possibilities, we worry. What if we don't like the new people? What if they bring new ideas we're not comfortable with? What if it's not the same as it was – not as cozy, not as warm, not as haimish, not as fun? Oy, more square feet to worry about — so much could go wrong! I see it in people's faces, hear it in their voices, feel it in my own anxiety dreams – change, change, change – OY!

And then I remember why we decided to do this. A myriad of reasons. Community is one – how do we live in community if not everyone can fit in the house? I particularly look forward to the opportunity to have many things happening at once in our new building – a wedding couple meeting in my study while the choir rehearses in the sanctuary, a community meeting takes place in the large classroom, and a cooking class with children and parents fills the kitchen with delicious smells.

And whenever we're feeling overwhelmed by the size or the newness or the change, we can re-focus on community by walking into the sanctuary to view the copper Story Lines strips – our own stories written by our own hands from our own hearts — on the wall behind the ark housing our old familiar Torah scrolls, and then look south to BCC's jewels – our stained glass windows reset in a framework that will show them off in new and unexpected ways. There in our sanctuary – our safe haven – will be these precious and constant reminders of where we came from and who we are.

Over the next few weeks I encourage you to come to 6000 W. Pico – our old familiar, comfortable, durable, stable home of 33 treasured years – and look around, take it in, remember some good times there (and some sad too), and say good-bye – gently. While you're there think of a memory, a word, a hope, a prayer that you can take with you from that sacred space into our new one. And then be sure to join us on Sunday April 10 at 2:00 pm for one last look and a prayer at 6000 before we dance our way together to the new place – 6090 W. Pico, BCC's new house of life.

The Presidents Award was established in 2003 to honor BCC members for their outstanding contributions to BCC and the wider community.

The annual brunch has grown over the years in stature, attendance and importantly the funds raised, which now represent approximately one-quarter of BCC's annual operating budget. BCC's Men's Havurah sponsored the following very successful event during February 2011:

Wine Tasting & Havdalah on February 12th

Hosted by BCC's President Bruce Maxwell, we had ten people who sampled several types of French wines including whites: Alsace Riesling, Loire Valley Chardonnay, and a Bordeaux Sauvignon Blanc, reds: Burgundy Pinot Noir, Rhone Syrah, and a Bordeaux Merlot, and a dessert wine: a classic Bordeaux Sauternes all under the guidance of wine connoisseur and BCC member Mark Brown. BCC's Young Torah Scholars

Leah Zimmerman, Education Director



Each week at Ohr Chayim we study Torah with the students. This winter we have taken a few weeks to investigate more deeply a few chapters of text. We have been slowly reading through the beginning of Exodus. We read the actual text, mostly reading directly from the English, occasionally translating more

closely from the Hebrew. As we read, we encourage students to ask questions, respond or comment. Along the way we ask them questions so as to engage them more in thinking about the text.

We do this because our goal isn't only that our students will be well acquainted with the stories in the Torah, but also we want them to be familiar with the ways in which we study Torah. When Jews study text, we ask questions, comment, argue, and work through problems to find new meaning. In our Ohr Chayim program we model this way of studying text for our K-5 year old students by providing an opportunity for them to actively engage in the text. The teachers take copious notes, recording what the students have said. We learn a lot about the text and the students from listening to their comments and their questions.

In the first chapter of Exodus, Pharaoh commands the midwives to kill the sons of the Israelites. We asked the students to imagine that they were the midwives. What would they do? Here are some of their answers:

Eliana (8yr): Make the boys look like girls and cover it up.

Dora (8yr): Build a house for all the boys, but keep it a secret.

Benji (8yr): I wouldn't follow the rules.

Ashira (9yr): I wouldn't know what to do. I would want to save the boys, but I wouldn't want to go to the dungeon.

Recently we read about God talking to Moses at the burning bush. God tells Moses to go confront Pharaoh and to bring the Israelites out of Egypt. Here are some of our students' reactions:

Benji (8yr) - How am I going to get Pharaoh to do that?

Eliana (8yr) - If God says we need to go that I would go.

Dora (8yr) - [Thinking as Moses] How do you get them [Israelites] to believe? Doesn't God know where the land is? Who am I to have the power to do it?

AJ (5yr) - How will Moses take the people?

James (6yr) - If I was Moses, I would take the people and follow God's orders.

Dora (8yr) - God will be with Moses "and be a partner with you" - this sort of helps Moses.

I could comment on their comments, but I think their voices speak for themselves. Even our youngest students ask questions and share reactions. To each question and reaction, I find myself also discovering new questions and reactions.

On Shabbat morning, the teachers bring new texts to the students and the students bring new meaning to us. Through the eyes and the words of our students, we also learn to see nuance and details. We revisit the questions of the texts from a point of discovery, not only of knowledge. We are lucky to have such engaging young "teachers" to remind us of how to ask and react in simple and awe inspiring ways. Perhaps the commandment "v'shinantem l'vanecha v'dibarta bam..." "and you shall teach your children these things..." isn't only because it is important for our children to learn, but also because we learn from teaching our children.

On March 19th we celebrate Purim. Come in costume! BCC families are invited to come at 6:00 pm to eat dinner together, make groggers and participate in other Purim activities.

Primarily lay-led, grass roots and experimental, the Virtual Minyan provides an invigorating environment through Torah study, discussion topics, religious services, and social gatherings for exchanging ideas and personal stories. Events are held during the day by conference call, which is free—excluding any long distance charges from your personal carrier. We hold a weekly Torah study on Thursday afternoons from 4:00 to 5:00 pm. We now feature a guest scholar once a month from different parts of North America. On February 17, former BCC Rabbinic Intern, Rabbi Daniel Mikelberg kicked off this new tradition from his synagogue in Vancouver, Canada.

Rabbi Joe Hample, the Jewish chaplain at Pelican Bay State Prison near Crescent City, California (and also a former BCC Rabbinic Intern) leads our March 3rd study. Other upcoming guest scholars include Rabbis Lisa Edwards, Larry Edwards and Heather Miller along with Maggie Anton, best-selling author of the Rashi's Daughters trilogy.

Virtual Minyan classes include 'Passover Traditions and Remembrances,' a two-part series to be held April 5th and 12th, both from 2:00 to 3:00 pm. We'll discuss common Passover observances and share our favorite Passover memories.

Our lay-led fully participatory Shabbat and High Holy Day services are highlighted by personalized siddurim and machzorim (prayer books). We encourage you to submit a prayer, poem or other writing that you find particularly meaningful and would like included. The Virtual Minyan's first Shabbat service will be held later this spring; this year's HHD schedule is Rosh Hashanah first day, Sept. 29th, and Yom Kippur day, Oct. 8th.

It was a great success as ten of us kibitzed for almost two hours at the Colony Café in West LA. Due to its popularity we'll offer this every other month. 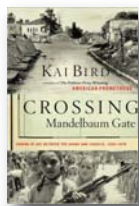

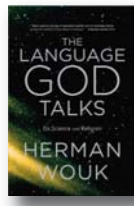
